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# A Survey on the Affect of the Field of Study on the Religiosity of Different University Students with Especial Reference to Sociology

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## Abstract

Our findings show that the only field that students left university with more religious attitudes in regard of what they had at the entrance are Architecture students.

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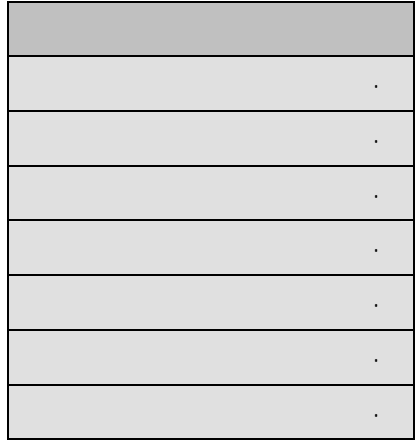
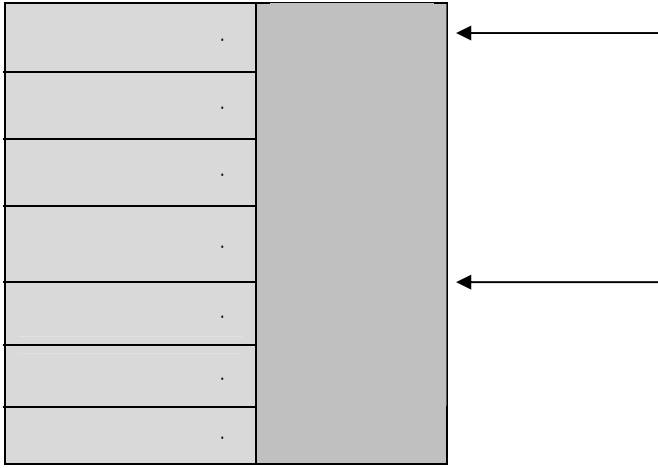
